

Our Learning

This week:

In math this week, we continued our unit on place value within 50. The children have been practicing grouping bigger amounts of quantity into 10's to make them easier to count. They also learnt to partition a 2 digit number into 10's and ones using base 10 resources and a place value chart.

In English this week, spent time labelling the front cover of what the ladybird hard at the seaside. The children were challenged to label as many nouns as they could see! The children also had a go at predicting what noun they thought Lanky Len and Hefty Hugh would steal next in the story. A couple of children thought that they would try and steal the shark so they could sell it to a zoo! On Tuesday, we spent time sequencing key events from the story using key words such as: first, next and then.



In afternoon sessions this week, we have started our new RE unit on the Easter Story. The children discussed their experiences of when they get important visitors round their homes. We then discussed how Jesus was welcomed by others.



learning to solve word problems and answer reasoning auestions.






In RE, we have been looking at how people show respect in different religions and how we show respect at school. We then drew a picture and described someone that we respect.

Our Learning

This week in English, the children have been really enjoying the story 'The boy at the back of the class'. There have been some very interesting conversations that have arisen from reading the story. The children have been really good at showing empathy for the different characters and thinking about how the characters would react in different situations. The children have written a letter pretending that they were a head teacher and they have been researching Syria.

In Maths, the children have been continuing to learn about fractions. They have a better understanding of how many parts are needed to make a whole and they are starting to understand the concept of 'mixed numbers'.

Next week in Maths, the children are going to be partitioning mixed numbers and writing mixed numbers on a number line.

In English, the children are going to be writing a formal letter and taking part in a debate based on the story 'A boy at the back of the class.'

In the afternoons, we will be continuing to learn about Buddhism. Then on Thursday we have our exciting trip to Ufton Court to learn about the Anglo Saxons.

Please practise times tables with your child as much as possible and please speak to your child's class teacher if you would like advice on how to support your child at home.



This week, we enjoyed activities designed around STEM week: we made moveable vehicles in DT and visited the Science Museum too.









Our Learning

This week, we have been partaking in STEM week by designing and building our own space buggies. Using our knowledge of circuits, we created a motor and end the week by racing our vehicles! We also went to the Science Museum to explore a range of prior learning and apply it to new contexts.

In maths, we continued to focus on our topic of perimeter and area, and focus on strategies linked to polygons, rectangles and compound shapes.

In English, we started our new book '1001 Arabian Nights'. We made predictions about the story and explored a selection of traditional tales.

This term in PSHRE, we will be celebrating Neurodiversity and learning all about ASD, ADHD, dyslexia and dyspraxia.

Next week, we will start coding in ICT using Microbits, we will look at algorithms and making name badges using LED displays.

In maths, we will focus on drawing graphs and interpreting the information provided. We will further our mathematical skills by learning new strategies within two-way tables and interpreting timetables.

In English, we will continue to explore 1001 Arabian Nights through drama and retellings. Here, we will be comparing traditional tales to the adaptations in this text. We will then be creating our own version of a traditional tale that could become another chapter in 1001 Arabian Nights.

Our Learning

This week, in art, we examined Frida Kahlo's self portraits in more detail. We then created our own self-portraits to represent our cultural identity. In English, we used our drawings from this week to create setting descriptions, using our knowledge of the story and expanded noun phrases! In maths, we explored the new topic of shapes, focusing on finding vertically opposite angles and angles of a triangle.

Next week, in art, we will finish our art unit on Frida Kahlo by creating a surrealist self-portrait to represent our inner and outer self, using the skills we have learned during this topic.

In English, we will extend the narrative of the story by writing our own fiction piece. We will then continue to read The Last Wild as a class reader. In maths, we will complete the current topic of shapes, exploring circles, net shapes and angles in a quadrilateral.

PSHRE Focus: Healthy Me. In PSHRE this term, we will learn how to take responsibility for our wellbeing. We will know about different types of drugs and how they affect the human body — particularly the liver and the heart. I will understand that some people can be exploited and made to do things that are against the law. I will know why some people join gangs and the risks this involves . I understand what it means to be emotionally well and can explore people's attitudes towards mental health/illness.

They got to play with children from other schools and socialise with new faces. The children had a lovely day and picked up some very handy skills.






Travelling Book Fair



Spotlight on Psychology Services

Gary Nixon Educational Psychologist

Gary is an outstanding leader in education, health and children's services environments and is the Principal Educational and Child Psychologist here in Slough. He has previously held senior leadership positions in Shire, City and London Borough Areas and is a respected school leader, holding positions across all areas of SEND and learning, with specialist expertise in applied psychology, educational and organizational leadership and school improvement.

Within his professional life, Gary continues to influence national policy developments and is very passionate about the offer provided to our SEND young people, who are the heart of what we do as a service and why we do what we do.

All Educational Psychology work relates to the key themes of the SEND Code of Practice, including assessment of children and young people, which recognises the unique nature of every child and their unique individual circumstance. The Psychology Team, work with young people and their families to draw information together to develop a formulation of their strengths, needs and aspirations.

With this information Gary works to find the right approach to interventions and the support that would be helpful and beneficial going forward. This includes preparation of psychological advice to the authority as part of Education Health Care (EHC) needs assessments and supporting the council to understand needs and provision if a change of placement



or provision is requested or required. Our SEND young people deserve an inclusive service, where their needs are recognised, understood and form part of what we put in place to help them succeed in education.

In Slough, your child might be eligible for a Max Card if they:

- · have an EHC plan
- · receive DLA
- have a letter of diagnosis of substantial and long-term mental impairment from CAMHS
- have medical proof of a physical impairment that has a long-term effect on ability to do normal daily activities.

This register is for Slough Borough Council residents only.

SEND Area Inspection update

As our previous newsletters have highlighted, we are preparing for our local area inspection of the services and provision for our children and young people with SEND. We are currently in the process of refining our area strengths, and areas for further development.

We have significant strengths in our Early Years Education sector, our Children's Centres (who were recently inspected by Ofsted and rated Good and Outstanding!) and in the performance of our schools and colleges across the borough. We are keen to further improve the consistency of communication and the timeliness of our assessments across SEND and the Health Teams, working closely with partners such as Special Voices, schools, and other professionals.

We are a service committed to positive change, which won't happen overnight, but we are confident that the improvements will benefit our SEND young people and families, who deserve a better service. There is also a dedicated page on Slough Borough Council's website that relates to Ofsted's initial report on SEND and our written statement of action, which highlights the areas identified for improvement. We meet with our Ofsted colleagues regularly to measure our progress and to seek their advice on what meaningful changes can be made to keep us on track to a positive inspection. Be assured that work is happening every day on improvements, even if we don't announce it. For us improvement should not be a one-off event, but rather form part of our standard practice on a daily basis, ensuring that we are fit for purpose and evolving our SEND Local Offer.



What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

STREAMERS

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Livestreaming has become a big part of the entertainment people consume, and what began as a series of gamers sharing their screens has grown into a huge industry packed with personalities - and potential risks for your children. With over 2.5 million people watching Twitch, the most popular streaming service, at any one time, it's important to remain aware of the risks associated with streamers.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT


NEGATIVE INFLUENCES

While things have improved, streamers are often paid by companies to promote products, and this isn't always stated explicitly. While it's unlikely these goods will be harmful to your child, some streamers and influencers have engaged (knowingly or not) in scams in the past.

FINANCIAL HARM

Streamers will often have donation buttons on their screens for users to submit money. What can start as small amounts can quickly spiral as streamers engage with paying viewers more often, potentially leading to financial issues.

UNREALISTIC EXPECTATIONS



MISINFORMATION

Streamers are, in many ways, just like us - and they can get things wrong or reel off an opinion without having thought about it. Some can simply say awful things to get a rise out of viewers or to sway them to their side of a hot topic.

ADDICTION AND SCREEN TIME

If your child is watching a lot of a particular streamer, it can be just as damaging to their social life as playing too many video games.

Advice for Parents & Educators

EXPLAIN HOW STREAMING WORKS

For a younger viewer, being a streamer or influencer seems aspirational, but it involves a lot of work and no small degree of good fortune. Streamers are often managed and unable to speak freely due to sponsors, and influencers are just that influencing young minds, for better or for worse.

DO NOT LOG PAYMENT INFORMATION

Streamers can reward donations with additional content, on-camera "shout outs" and more. If you're unsure about who or what your child is watching, consider avoiding linking payment information. This is especially notable with Twitch, which is owned by Amazon and therefore has some crossover.

CHECK OUT STREAMING PLATFORMS

While Twitch was the defacto streaming service for years, YouTube has gained popularity, too. Then there are Kick and Rumble, which have grown in popularity with moves for big-name streamers - despite many being dogged by controversy.

SET SCREEN TIME LIMITS

You can set screentime limits for mobile apps on iOS and Google, but with other platforms like a PC it may be more difficult to keep tabs. Consider checking in regularly to ensure your children aren't watching content they shouldn't be.
